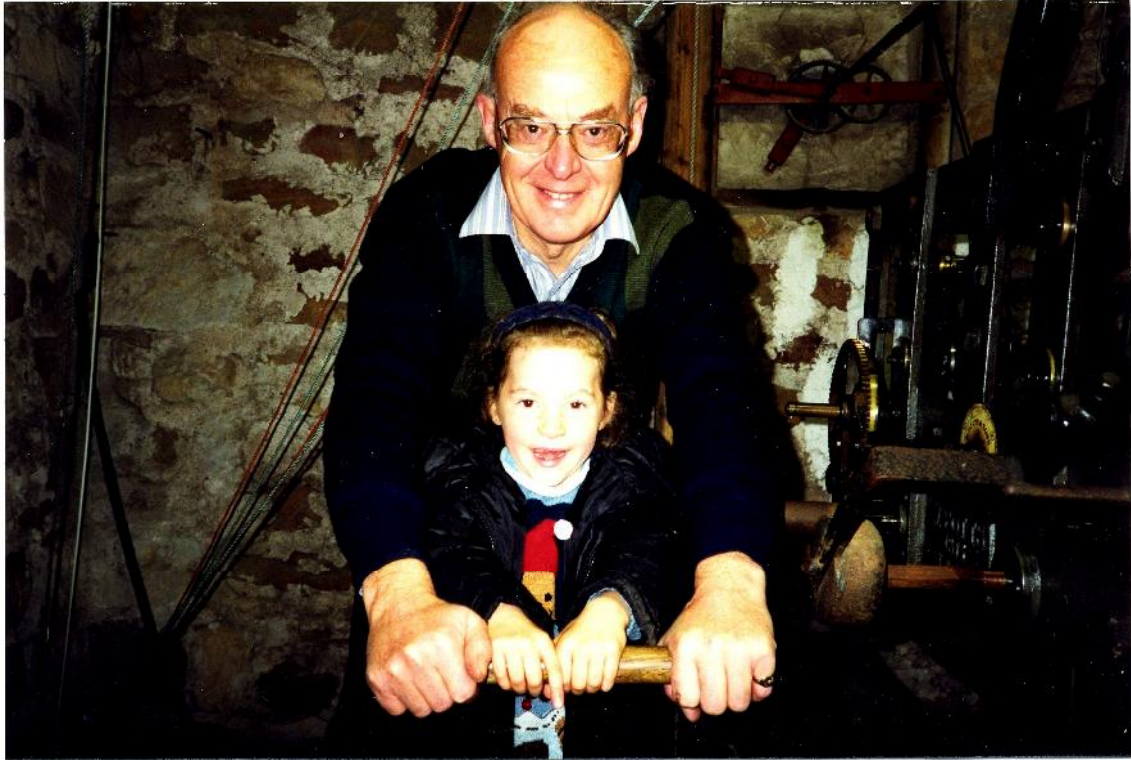
## Bramham Church

Villagers heard the bells of Bramham Church ring out for the first time in many years recently thanks to a visiting team of ringers from Thorner. The bells were repaired recently and Mr Noel Taylor from Thorner is already training local ringers whose aim is to ring the Millennium in Bramham. Another recent and very useful innovation in church has been an induction loop system which enables those using hearing aids to tune into services much more easily. This was made possible thanks to funds made available from the Leslie Young Memorial Fund. And finally another major project has been completed with the church path which runs the full length of the churchyard being completely restored and re-laid. The substantial cost of several thousand pounds came from the proceeds of two local publications, Bramham-The Village in Times Past, and Tails of a Village Lad, as well as from many coffee mornings held locally.

So, its clearly been a busy but exciting time in and around Bramham Church in early 1998 and perhaps its time now for a while at least to sit back and enjoy the fruit of our labours.

until 2003

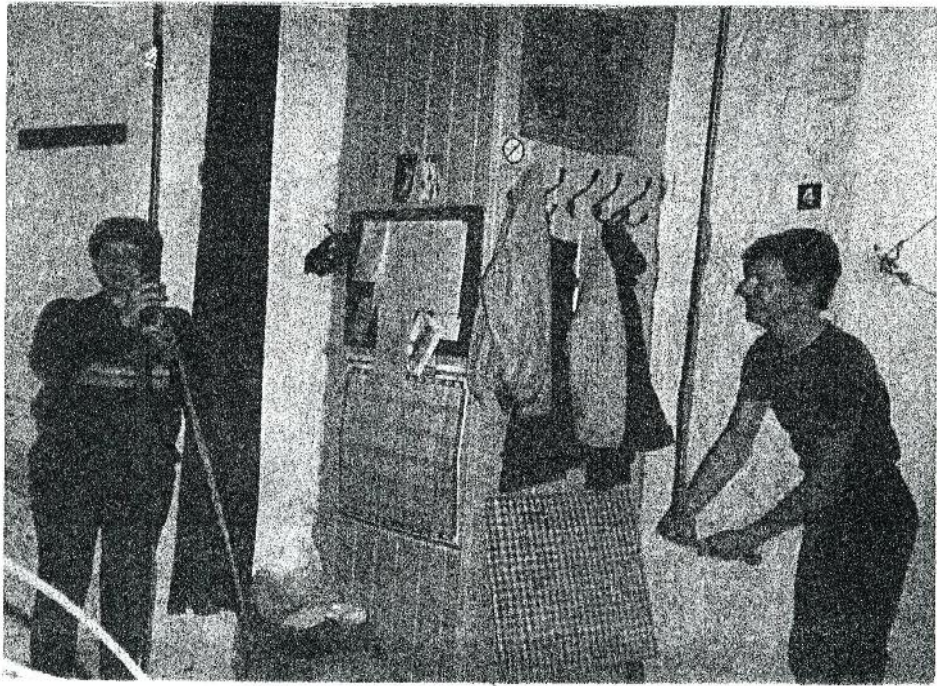
