



square, Bramham. Mrs. Sanderson, who is 76, was an eye witness of the crash. She has a special reason for remembering the incident because it occurred the day before her first child was born.

"I was able to see the whole crash from the cottage at the top to Town Hill where I was temporarily living while my husband was serving with the Royal Field Artillery in France," Mrs. Sanderson recalled. "You can get a good view over the whole village from there."

Mrs. Sanderson said it was shortly after 10 p.m. on March 11th, 1918, when she saw an aeroplane descending with its rear end alight. Despite her condition Mrs. Sanderson ran about half-a-mile downhill and across a beck to the scene of the crash.

The aircraft's engine had fallen to the ground at a point where the new primary school now stands and the machine itself struck

top of a tree on the opposite side of the road before plunging into a field. The pilot was killed instantly. "Some four or five years later a gold watch belonging to the dead pilot was found at the scene of the crash," Mrs. Sanderson added. "It was returned to his relatives in America."
