**BRAMHAM MOOR**, in the parish of Bramham, wap. of Barkston Ash; 5 miles SW. of Tadcaster. Here are large remains of the Roman Way, called Watling Street, from which consular road came divers vicinales, by Thorner and Shadwell, through Street-lane and Hawcater-rig to Addle. The following observations on the view from this common were made by John Watson, Esq. of Malton, in the year 1781;—"Upon the middle of this moor, a man may see ten miles around him; within those ten miles there is as much free stone as would build ten cities, each as large as York; within those ten miles there is as much good oak timber as would build those ten cities; there is as much limestone and coals to burn it into lime as the building of those ten cities would require; there is also as much clay and sand and coals to burn them into bricks and tiles as would build those ten cities; within those ten miles there are two iron forges sufficient to furnish iron for the building of those ten cities, and ten thousand tons to spare; within those ten miles there is lead sufficient for the ten cities, and ten thousand fadders to spare; within those ten miles there is a good coal seam sufficient to furnish those ten cities with firing for 10,000 years; within those ten miles there are three navigable rivers, from any of which a man may take shipping and sail to any part of the world; within those ten miles there are seventy gentlemen's houses, all keeping coaches, and the least of them an Esquire, and ten parks and forests well

stocked with deer; within those ten miles there are ten market towns, one of which may be supposed to return £10,000 per week." Cookson Jph. cheese factor, Cross roads *Bramham Park*, wap. of Barkston Ash; 4 miles S. of Wetherby. A beautiful situation in a fine country. This house, which was built by Robert Benson, Lord Bingley, commands a most extensive prospect, embellished with a distant view of the magnificent cathedral of York.

### TADCASTER,

The Calcaria of the Romans, is situated partly in the wapentake of Barkston Ash, in the west riding, and partly in the Ainsty of York, the middle of the bridge dividing the two jurisdictions; it is 9 miles from York, on the high road to London, 14 from Leeds, and 185 from London. The town is clean and well-built, and the streets are disposed in the form of a cross, by the roads to York, Ferry-bridge, and Leeds. It has a good market on the Wednesday, and being the great thoroughfare from York to the South, and to the West, it generally exhibits a lively and bustling scene.— Many ancient coins have been found in this place, and it was considered by the Romans as one of the outposts of their chief military station, which was the city of York. On the south bank of the river there was formerly a castle, from the materials of which the present bridge over the Wharf, which is one of the finest in the county, was built at the beginning of the last century, and considerably enlarged about 30 years ago. The church, which is a vicarage, dedicated to St. Mary, and valued in the King's books at £8. 4s. 9d. stands upon part of the site of the ancient castle; it formerly belonged to the abbey of Salley, in Craven, but is now in the gift of the Earl of Egremont. Besides the church there are in this town places of worship for the Dissenters and the Methodists. Tadcaster has always been regarded as an important military station, and in the civil wars of England, this town and its

placed Henry VI. and elevated Edward IV. to the throne of these realms.— Here the folly of the nation in those times of darkness and ignorance was fully exhibited, and upwards of 36,000 Englishmen sacrificed their lives in deciding the question, whether a juvenile tyrant or an imbecile prince should be their master. The people took different symbols of party, the partizans of the house of Lancaster chose the red rose as their mark of distinction, and those of York the white rose. The battle of Towton was fought on Palm Sunday, the 29th of March, 1461.— Edward IV. with his General, the Earl of Warwick, brought 40,000 chosen troops to the field, and Margaret of Anjou assembled an army of 60,000, under the Duke of Somerset. While the Yorkists were advancing to the charge, there happened a great fall of snow, which driving full in the faces of their enemies, blinded them; this advantage was improved by a stratagem of Lord Falconberg's. That nobleman, who led the van in the army of Edward, ordered a body of infantry to advance before the line, and after having sent a volley of flight-arrows amongst the enemy, immediately retired. The Lancastrians, imagining that they had got within reach of the opposite army, discharged all their arrows, which fell short of the Yorkists. After their quivers were emptied, Edward advanced his line, and did execution with impunity on the dismayed Lancastrians. The bow, however, was soon laid aside, and the sword decided the combat, which ended with the day in a total victory on the side of the Yorkists. Edward had issued orders before the battle to give no quarter.— The routed army was pursued with a dreadful slaughter. The flying troops shaped their course for Tadcaster bridge, but despairing of reaching it, because they were so hotly pressed, they turned aside towards the place where the Cock, a small rivulet, runs into the Wharf. This was done with so much hurry and disorder, that the bed of the rivulet was soon filled with human bodies, which served as a bridge for the pursued and pursuers to pass over. The slaughter at this point



was tremendous; 36,776 men fell in the battle and retreat; and the waters of the Wharf were crimsoned with the blood of the victims: †

- “ England had long been mad, and scarr'd herself;  
 “ The brother blindly shed the brother's blood,  
 “ The father rashly slaughtered his own son,  
 “ The son, compell'd, was butcher to the sire;  
 “ All this divided York and Lancaster,  
 “ Divided in their dire division.”

Henry and Margaret, who had remained at York during the battle, on hearing of its disastrous result, retired to Scotland, and afterwards quitted the kingdom, while Edward, after visiting York, returned to London, and was crowned on the 29th of July following.

In later times, when Charles I. and the parliament contended for authority, a battle contested with equal obstinacy, but with much less bloodshed, was fought at Tadcaster, between the Earl of Newcastle and Sir Thomas Fairfax. The Earl being appointed to the command of the royal army, in 1642, commenced his operations by marching from York with 4000 men, and seven pieces of cannon, to attack the town of Tadcaster, where the parliamentary General was posted with 700 troops. § The Earl began his attack upon Sir Thomas's works about 11 o'clock in the morning, and continued it till dusk without intermission, during which time 40,000 musket shots were discharged, besides the fire from the artillery; but the slaughter bore no proportion to the shot expended, as the number killed on both sides did not exceed 300. The ammunition of the

royalists failing, they were obliged to desist, with the intention to renew the attack the next morning, when a further supply should arrive from York. The disparity of force disinclining Sir Thomas Fairfax to sustain another day's engagement, he drew off his men to Selby and Cawood in the night, and the following morning the royalists marched into Tadcaster without opposition. The only person of any note who fell in the battle of Tadcaster was Captain Lister, who was shot by a bullet in the head, and, relating to whom, Thoresby, in his *Ducatus*, mentions the following remarkable instance of filial affection:—The Captain's son passing through Tadcaster some years after the battle, finding the sexton at work in the choir, inquired where his father, Captain Lister, was buried? To which the sexton replied by showing him a skull, just dug up, which he averred was the head of the Captain. On examining the skull, a bullet was found lodged in it, and this testimony to the truth of the grave-digger's words so struck the young man, that he sickened at the sight, and died soon after.

Tadcaster has a Free School, and a Hospital for 12 poor persons, called the Hospital of Jesus, founded by Dr. Oglethorpe, Bishop of Carlisle, who crowned Queen Elizabeth, but was afterwards deprived of his see, for adhering to his religion. In the year 1714, Henry O'Bryen, the last Earl of Thomond, in Ireland, was created Baron and Viscount Tadcaster, but dying without issue, in 1742, the title became extinct. Tadcaster is not a place of much trade, though it is well situated for that purpose, and stands upon the banks of a fine river, which is navigable up to the town. The population of this place, according to the census of 1821, amounts to 2426.



population since 1801, from about 300 to upwards of 800 souls, which, added to those in Thorp Arch, on the opposite side of the river, swell the total number of inhabitants to about 1100. In 1836, the township of Clifford-cum-Boston was warmly contested for the office of acting overseer of the poor, by Jeremiah Thompson and Wm. Pick, and during the election ladies were seen riding in carriages to the poll to tender their suffrages. THORP ARCH *village and parish* is in the *West Division of the Ainsty Wapentake*, and has only 316 inhabitants and 1580 acres of land, with two corn mills, a paper mill, and two detached portions, called *Hall Parks* and *Hall Ings*, lying beyond Walton. Randall Gossip, Esq., the lord of the manor and owner of most of the parish, resides at *Thorp Arch Hall*, a beautifully situated mansion. The parish derived the latter part of its name from the family of D'Archis, who came in with the Conqueror, and had large possessions in this neighbourhood. The common and open field were enclosed in 1817. The CHURCH, (All Saints) is of very ancient foundation, but was rebuilt, except the tower, in 1754, in the plain Gothic style. In the tower is an ancient ornamented Saxon arch, supposed to have been brought from a dismantled religious house. The benefice was ordained a *vicarage* by Archbishop Sewal, in 1258, and is valued in K.B. at £3. 15s. 5d., and in 1831, at £356, being endowed with the great tithes purchased about a century ago from the Wrightson family, by subscription, and by the liberal donations of Mr. Robinson, of Leeds, Lady Elizabeth Hastings, the Rev. — Wetherherd, and Queen Anne's Bounty. Mrs. Wheeler is the patron, and the Rev. Francis Hastings Stuart, Monteath, the incumbent. About 90 acres of land here belongs to the Trustees of Lady Elizabeth Hastings Charities, from which a *Free School* is supported in the village.
