Until the second half of the twentieth century, Bramham was, above all, a farming community, with a large proportion of its residents engaged full - or part - time in farming or country activities. Farms and property locally came mainly under the ownership of four large estates -- the Lane Fox or Bingley Estate at Bramham Park; the Estate of Lord Headley; the Gascoignes of Hazlewood Castle, who were Lords of the Manor; and latterly the brewery lands of the Smith family. The 1817 map of the parish illustrates that much of the land belonged to the first two of these, a situation which had existed, with other families, for centuries. Thus, traditionally, most farms were occupied, as is still the case, by tenant farmers. The 1841Census listed 24 farmers in Bramham Parish.

However, as the 1817 map shows, within this framework, were blocks of land, usually a field or two, owned by other individuals who may or may not have lived around Bramham. Besides this, most of the houses, even the meanest cottages, had their own bit of land attached and their own pigstye, so that most villagers had a stake in the production of foodstuffs for their own consumption as well as a job on a local farm.

The pattern of farms within the parish consisted of some outside the village, and some whose houses and buildings were situated within the village itself, with fields outside. Examples were Greenhill Farm, whose lands stretched from Aberford Road, next to the allotments, up to New York Farm on Toulston Road, plus fields at the bottom of Heygate; and Laurel Grove Farm whose fields lay away beyond Spen Lane and across towards Oglethorpe, again with a field down Heygate. There is much detailed information in the 1818 Tenancy Book.

Which fields belonged to which farms was very much a matter of ancient history, and the names of some farms reflected the lands they worked [Westwood and Heygate would be meaningful today; Wise Warren and Greenhill probably would not.]

No working farms lying within the village itself exist in 2000; they have been converted or demolished, often within living memory.
