The Yorkshire Archaeological Society (YAS) was founded in 1863, and its objectives include the study of archaeology and local history. It has specialist sections dealing with Prehistory research; Roman antiquities; Mediaeval; Georgian; Industrial; Local; and Family history. There are also three publishing sections for The Record Series; Parish Registers; and Wakefield Court Rolls.

Library and Archives The YAS has a permanent headquarters at "Claremont" 23 Clarendon Road, Leeds. Its library contains a comprehensive collection of Yorkshire history and archaeology. Its archives, which are administered by the West Yorkshire Archives and Archaeology Joint Committee, contain a large number of family, manorial, estate and antiquarian papers; pedigrees, maps and drawings, as well as unpublished transcripts of some Yorkshire Parish Registers and Monumental Inscriptions.

The Family History and Population Studies Section was formed in 1973 to promote mutual help amongst those with an interest in genealogy and historical demography. Regular lectures are held at Claremont, and many members participate in projects some of which are published, while other material may be consulted at Claremont or by post. Also at Claremont is the latest microfiche of the International Genealogical Index (IGI) and the National Strays Index

Publications The 'YORKSHIRE FAMILY HISTORIAN' is the Section's journal, it is issued 6 times a year for Members and Subscribers to exchange news, articles and requests or offers of help.

The Section publishes Census Indexes in book form and on microfiche. For a full list of books published please see lists in the journal.

FOREWORD

This new volume covers further villages to the East of Leeds, in what is still largely an agricultural area, albeit with some coal mining and now with some of the villages served by the railway. There are also many representatives of more affluent folk. Besides the basket makers, butchers, millers, gamekeepers, maltsters and wheelwrights, there is a wine and spirit merchant, a tea dealer, a paper maker, a printer and bookbinder and more than one butler. Bramham College is providing over 100 boys with a classical education and there is also a boarding school for girls. John Elsworth, schoolmaster and farmer, has more than 30 boys as pupils at Toulston Lodge (which years later was bought by the West Riding to house Tadcaster Grammar School).

For this valuable addition to our indexes to the 1851 Census for Leeds and the surrounding areas we are again indebted to Lesley Holmes and her team of colleagues, whose single-minded persistence and high standards are admired and appreciated by us all.

INTRODUCTION

This latest Census Index covers further villages to the North East of Leeds. The piece number is HO 107 2352, but to save typing time, this number has been omitted and only the folio reference given. Under each surname, the entry reads: forename, age, occupation (where given), birthplace and folio reference followed by 'N' from folio 607. Generally, all details have been transcribed as given. Thus abbreviated names have been left as such & spelling or geographical errors have not been corrected. The reader is advised to check all facts from both the original film or other sources. The folio number was stamped on the top right-hand corner of alternate pages on the original returns. HOWEVER there has been a problem with this film! PLEASE NOTE CAREFULLY!

The first 55 folios on the reel were North Riding, followed by West Riding where the numbering started AGAIN! Hence, there were 2 sets of folios which were numbered 4 - 55. In this section of the reel it is West Riding until folio 607, so 'W' hasn't been used, only 'N' as mentioned above. HOWEVER, the reader may find films which have re-stamped from folio 55 (ie you may find 2 numbers) and eg folio 400 may well be marked 454 or similar. So please remember you may need to add 54 throughout to the folio number given here. We have kept to the original folio numbers in this Index.

As much information as possible has been retained, although abbreviations have been used for many occupations, most of these are listed on page iv, but others have been used in such a way that the reader should be able to understand what is intended. Asterisks * have been used where there is extra detail in the occupation or birthplace column and occasionally where two very similar surnames have been combined.

Also on page iv is a guide to the Enumeration Districts (ED's). County names have been abbreviated & the Chapman County Codes are listed.

Many of the streets in the villages were left blank but where given, individual addresses have been included. The use of a map of the period may help to locate some of the specific addresses.

Folios 388 - 405: BRAMHAM: Vicarage - Paper Mill Bar - Oglethorpe Hall - Hope Hall - Star Inn - Brick Yd - West Woods - Red Lion - Clifford Mills - Low Mill - Windmill Hill.

Folios 409 - 425: BRAMHAM: Bramham Village - Bramham Park - Well Hill - Spen Fm - Paradise - Headley Hall - Wise Warren Fm - New York - South Lodge - Bramham College - Bow Cliffe House.
