Since the Second World War, and up to the Millennium , the following estates of private housing were constructed:

Aberford Road: block of houses. 1980's. Started by Richard Walker of Castleford ; after his bankruptcy completed by Claxton \& Gambol .

Almshouse Hill / Crag Gardens: 1968. Kettlewell of Boston Spa.
Bradford Close : 1995. Arncliffe [ The only allowed brick built estate in this period, to tone in with the Council block already in existence. ]

## Church Meadows : 1994.

Fine Garth Close : 1980 's Erkulis.

Firbeck Road: 1) c1970: Sissons.
2) 1996 : Consort Homes.
3) 1999 : Auckley Homes.
[ Before each phase of building, but especially before the latter two, much protest was made, by villagers and the parish council, who tried to persuade Leeds MDC not to allow the construction of houses on land which had traditionally acted as a flood plain for the Beck. Despite such local, knowledgeable protest, permission was given, with assurances that modern methods, including deep pile driving and superior foundation work, would eliminate the problem. Nothing was learned, it seemed, from the fact that some of the original phase housing was, by the late 90 's, suffering from subsidence. In fact, around the very time permissions were granted for second and third phase housing [ both to be nearer the Beck ], several houses at the Clifford end of Firbeck had to have substantial rebuilding of their foundations, while sewerage was being forced to the surface in some gardens .]

Freely Lane: 2001 Kebbel Homes [ the first $£ 400 \mathrm{~K}$ ' ordinary ' houses.

Low Way: 11.94--7.95: Consort Homes.

Milnthorpe: 1994-5: Redrow Homes.
[This estate was often referred to as "Legoland ", owing partly to its appearance, partly to older villagers ' resentment at the fact that the land here had originally been given to the village by the Lane Fox family, for recreational purposes. Unfortunately, the generous gift was not properly recorded, and the land was sold by a later generation for building.]

The slightly older houses beyond Milnthorpe Farm were built by Kettlewell of Boston Spa in the 1980 's.

The Miln [ 2002 ] on ' Poggy Lane' completed this estate.

Prospect Bank : 1968-9: Ryedale Homes of Malton [ see separate note ].

Tay Homes [ Lyndon, Orchard, The Knoll] : early 1990 's: Tay Homes.

For a number of years, Leeds MDC tried to sell the Bramham House land on Freely Lane for building, whilst the Rhodes family sought permission to build on the Woodyard. Both projects were close to receiving the go - ahead in 2003 , and can be expected to make Bramham considerably larger. Once they are built, there being virtually no land left to develop within the village itself, expect Leeds to engineer permissions for development along the $\mathrm{A}[\mathrm{M}]$ corridor ; on the land between Bramham and Clifford; with, once again , the spectre of a Headley new town on University Farm and Lane Fox land.

Apart from the new estates, the building of single infill houses, and small groups of houses, took place throughout this period, so that Bramham became ever more a small suburban dormitory in a rural setting.
