It will be sung in procession, the congregation standing, instead of kneeling, and to those who may have felt the Litany rather long, I think this will be found to be a very welcome change.

VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

I am changing the day of our weekly Intercession Service for the Forces, from Friday to Wednesday. I think this will make it easier for people to come and pray for the men, because so often there are dances or other activities on Friday evenings, whereas Wednesday is free. The time is the same—6.45 p.m.—and it lasts thirty minutes. I hope this winter that more people will come to lay our nation's cause and our troops' welfare before GOD our Father; especially I hope that wives of men in the Forces will try to be there: it is such a help to remember their needs together in Church, and if the men know you are praying for them on a particular evening, it gives them encouragement too.

Mr. Tidmarsh is leaving us to take up the post of Organist at Wetherby Church. I am sure we all wish him well in his new work. We welcome in his place Miss O. Fenwick, who is well known to all of us. In spite of

the lack of men in the choir, there is plenty of training to do with the boys. I hope mothers of choirboys will co-operate and see they regularly turn up at practices.

The patronal festival of All Saints' (November 1st) is on a Saturday. The services are given below. I hope to arrange a cinema show for the children, but they must bring their own food and sugar.
